






DISCUSSION

Young people are much less likely to be registered to vote than older people - why do you think this is?

POSSIBLE REASONS WHY YOUNG PEOPLE DON'T REGISTER TO VOTE



Young people are more likely to be **private renters** and move more frequently, whereas older people tend to own their own home.



Young people are **not interested** in politics
and don't think it will
change anything.



Older generations are more likely to think they have a **duty to vote** rather than a choice, because of the way that they were brought up.




Young adults move

WHY ARE PEOPLE OF COLOUR LESS LIKELY TO REGISTER TO VOTE?





WHY MIGHT THIS BE?

Some possible reasons include:

- Some people may be first generation immigrants who do not meet the eligibility criteria to vote yet.
- Some people may be on low incomes and/or living in rented housing. Renters and those on a low income are both groups that are less likely to be registered to vote.

Some people may speak English as a second language and experience challenges understanding the voter registration process or following politics more broadly.







OTHER BENEFITS OF REGISTERING TO VOTE

When you register to vote you join the ELECTORAL REGISTER. This also gives you some other advantages:



Registering to vote improves your credit score - this can make it easier to get a loan, mortgage or mobile phone contract.



Once you are 18 you can take part in jury duty - people are only invited to be part of a jury if they are registered to vote.



It means you have more of a say - by registering, your needs are more likely to be considered and more resources may go to your area.



HOW DO I REGISTER TO VOTE?

To vote, you need to check your eligibility and register

It only takes 5 minutes - you just need to fill in where you live, your date of birth, name, nationality and National Insurance number

Where do I find my National Insurance number? This should have been posted or emailed to you once you turned 16. If you have a job, it will be on your payslip. If you don't have it don't worry, you can register without it!






WHO ELSE CAN YOU TELL ABOUT REGISTERING TO VOTE?

EXTENSION

Below are some of the groups that are less likely to be registered to vote:

- Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic groups
- European nationals
- Renters (people that don't own their own homes)

Why do you think these groups might be less likely to be registered to vote? Try to think of at least one reason for each group.

Why is it important that all groups register and actively participate in elections?






EXTENSION: WHY DO YOU THINK RENTERS ARE LESS LIKELY TO

REGISTER?

WHY MIGHT THIS BE?

Some possible reasons include:

- Homeless people or people without a fixed address can register to vote, but in practice it's quite difficult. Finding somewhere that will allow you to claim that it's a 'place of temporary residence' (which is needed for registering) can be a challenge. They also might not be aware that they can register without a fixed address.
- Renters are more likely to be young and on a low income. Young people and those on a low income are both groups that are less likely to be registered to vote.

- Renters are likely to move around more, so might not re-register to vote at their new address.
- Homeowners are more likely to be settled in their community long-term and be motivated to have a say on how it's run.
